Child Abuse and what to look for:

No parent or carer wantshink abouted possibility of their dobid comigna victim of abuse, and most chileter are never abused. Even, it is important for parente tawar of the possibility and know that locals availablif the unthinkabloes happen.

Most childn know their abusers. They enfantily members or friends of family, someone who works whithe child or sometree who lives in the community.

There are many signs or indicators that damight be suffregriabuse. There may be injuries, but it is mentikely that you will meostione change in your child's behaviour. If you notice anything that concerns you, tallyour challes see if youan find out what is happening. Remember that, if you do theig harmed, shor he may elbo frighten beto tell you. If your dhiblecomes distrestsor you are not happy twithe explanations uncould talk to an adult you trust, call a the loptic hildren's sociate carrvices (01709) 336080.

Some signs to look for are:

- Bruises or other injuries.
- A change in behavior from quiet to loud, or from happing ky to withdrawn.
- Pain or discomfort.
- Fear of a particular person.
- Secrecy around a relationship with a particular person.
- Reluctance to discuss where they go, or who they are with.
- Sexual talk or knowledge beyond their years.
- Being watchful, or always on edge.
 Losing interest in their appearance, hobbies or family life.
- Alcohol or drug taking.
- Having money and refusing to say where it has come from.
- Wetting the bed.
- Becoming clingy.

What we will do if we have a concern about your child:

If we are concerned that your child may be at risk of abuse or neglect we must follow the agreed safeguarding procedures procedures have been written to protect all students. They comply with our statutory responsibilities and are designed to support students, familie and staff. The procedures are based on the principle that the welfare of the child is the most important consideration.

- Spending more and more time on the internet.
- Being secretive eluctant to talk about their internet activity, closing the screen page
 when you are close spending less time with the family, or giving up previous
 hobbies and interests, losing interest in their schoolwork, regularly failing to complete
 homework.
- Starting to talk about "new friends" that you have not met and who do not visit your home.
- Being overly possessive of their mobile phone or expressives overeacting if someone picks it up or asks to borrow it.
- Showing fear or discomfort when their phone rings, or quickly turning it off without answering.
- Undergoing a change in personality ou cannot attribute to any obvious cause.
